Staff News

Staff new to the School have been going through the Educator Impact appraisal process (trialled successfully last term by nine of my colleagues) which focuses on their performance against the standards laid down by AITSL. This provides detailed feedback on their work in the classroom which is then followed by an appraisal interview with me and agreement on goals to be focused on in Term 2. Mrs Chelsea Warren is expecting her first child in the not-too-distant future and so is currently on maternity leave. Her timetable will be taught by Mrs Lara Williams who currently teaches SOSE to a Year 7 class.

We had to say a poignant farewell to Revd Bob Booth who has now completed his stint as our locum Chaplain. In the short term he will be replaced by the new locum Parish Priest Revd Alan Blair but I am currently in the process of seeking a full-time Chaplain, realistically from January 2017. The need for a full-time Chaplain has been well-established and Revd Bob showed us all how effective the position can be, so it is high time that such an appointment is made. I will, of course, keep you apprised of developments in this regard.

Mrs Christine Brandenburg has, sadly, decided to retire from her role as House Mother in McVay House. She has played a pivotal role in the pastoral care of our boarders and has also acted in the role of counsellor for all our students so she will be sorely missed. Mrs Karen Hatton will act as relief House Mother for the first few weeks of Term 2 and we have made other arrangements for counselling as outlined below.

Counselling

We will have access to counselling in the form of Vanessa from Esperance Psychology on a Tuesday from 0900-1200 in the Careers/Meeting Room at the front of the School Parents and carers will need to sign a permission form if they wish their child to have access to these services which are usually arranged after discussion with me.

Parent-Teacher Meetings

It was good for my colleagues and me to have the opportunity to meet with parents of students in Year 7 to review progress in their first term here. Such meetings are a valuable means of parents and teaching staff speaking with each other about the education of students here and allowing the exchange of helpful information in this regard.

The meeting for parents of students in Years 11 and 12 will take place during Week 2 of next term, from 1530 on Wednesday 4th May. Full details of how to use our on-line booking service will be sent out during Week 1 with confirmation of all the final details.

The meeting for parents of students in Years 8 to 10 will be held in Week 7 with final date and timings yet to be confirmed.

Year 10 parents will also be notified early next term of the consultation meetings to discuss subject choices for Year 11, to be held next term in accordance with the outline timetable already distributed. Year 10 students have already had preliminary discussions about possible (and at this stage very tentative) choices but I would simply stress again that final choices of subjects, and whether ATAR or General, will only be made after the full process of consultation with students and parents has been carried out.

Mopeds on Smith Street

Parents of students who ride to School on mopeds should be aware that their sons and daughters have already been told about the dangers of taking a short cut along Smith Street. The junction between Smith Street and Twilight Beach Road is closed to all vehicular traffic because it is dangerous. Any student using this shortcut will have the right to use their moped withdrawn so I thank you in advance for your help in reinforcing this message.

Start of Term 2

Term starts at 0840 on Tuesday 26th April with Assembly at 1000 that morning; Jackman House is on duty. Of course details of all events for the term are in the calendar which appears in SEQTA, on the website and in Skoolbag; notification of updates appear in my weekly comment (or blog - such an inelegant term!).

Uniform for Term 2 is our so-called winter rig, details of which are in the student handbook. We normally allow for a grace period of a couple of weeks to transition to the winter rig, if this is necessary. Rain(sometimes called spray) jackets can be worn over the normal blazer on days when it is wet but please note it cannot be used as a substitute for the blazer.

It has been a busy and productive term and the holidays will provide a welcome chance to recuperate. I wish you all a happy time together as families, wherever this may be, and a safe return for the start of term on Tuesday 26th April.

BIOLOGY YEAR 11 INVESTIGATION LAKE MONJINUP

Environmental Officers, Julie Waters and Rachel from the Esperance Council are supporting our students to learn field techniques used in Biology and the effects of a fire on plant growth, including native species and weeds. Students have been collecting samples of plants to press. They are progressively learning how to identify each species present. This is an ongoing project where students will continue to monitor and help with the management of Lake Monjiniup.





Arts immersion (PIAF Camp 2016)

Esperance Anglican Community School students are culturally enriched after taking part in this year's PIAF Camp.

The four-day camp saw 22 Year 11 and 12 EACS students travel to Perth with teachers Lyndel Taylor and Marcia Leonard to take in a range of events at the Perth International Arts Festival from February 17-20.

The students were fully immersed in a range of arts activities including visits to galleries, theatres and an outdoor cinema. They seized the opportunity to view works by international visual and performing artists and to take part in workshop discussions with them.

Highlights of the camp included the musical theatre extravaganza Lion King, an interactive audio exhibition entitled A Mile in Their Shoes (which saw students exposed to other people's real-life stories while literally walking in their shoes) and an intimate, moving and funny one-man show called The Object Room. This show was unique in every way and even afforded our students the opportunity to become part of the show.

We also enjoyed an international movie experience under the stars at Somerville and a very different version of Hamlet featuring live music and circus-style aerial work.

Over the four days the students have drawn, pondered, explored, questioned, laughed, been moved, inspired and even danced as they made the most of every opportunity.

The programme was jam-packed and the students returned a little weary but definitely artistically richer for the experience.

Banners in the Terrace is one of the state's largest community arts projects, featuring banners from Councils from all over Western Australia, which go on display along St Georges and Adelaide Terraces, during the Annual Local Government Convention in July/August each year.

2016 Local Design Competition

Individuals, schools, community groups and professional artists within the Shire of Esperance are invited to submit designs for the 2016 competition. Councillors will vote for the best local design to be submitted into the WALGA state-wide Banners in the Terrace competition.

A prize of \$100 gift voucher from a local business to the winner and \$50 gift vouchers for two runners-up, whose designs best reflect the theme 'Local Impact'.

The Shire arranges for the local winning design to be digitally printed and exhibited along St Georges and Adelaide Terraces in the City of Perth during the annual WA Local Government Convention. The local finalist will also be in the running to win the state-wide 2016 Banners in the Terrace Competition.

The winning design, as chosen by the Shire of Esperance, is transferred to a 3.4m x 1.5m banner and will fly in St Georges Terrace as a part of Local Government Week. The banner will be on display with up to 80 other WA local government banners.

Banner Entry Information

Entries to the Banners in the Terrace competition are displayed for two weeks along St Georges and Adelaide Terrace allowing communities and regions throughout Western Australia to showcase local talents to thousands of people visiting the Perth CBD

The winning design, as chosen by the Shire of Esperance, is transferred to a 3.4m x 1.5m banner and will fly in St Georges Terrace as a part of Local Government Week. The banner will be on display with up to 80 other WA local government banners.

The theme for the banner is 'Local Impact'.

Banner Criteria:

- · The design should promote a bright, positive image of Esperance
- The design should use large and bold images as minor details will not be seen when the banners are on display
- · The design can be drawn, painted or digitally created and printed
- · The word ESPERANCE must appear in large, clear lettering
- · Only one side of the banner should have artwork

The Banners will be judged on:

- · Creative composition
- Use of colour and creativity
- Artistic merit
- · Individuality and boldness
- · Is it easy to identify where the banner comes from?
- · Can you read the ESPERANCE name?
- · Does the banner capture the essence of the theme "Local Impact"

Entries must be submitted on paper and must be 40cm high X 17.5cm wide.

Entries must be submitted to the Shire of Esperance by Friday 29 April 2016.

Please note: The winning design will be made into a full scale banner 3.4m high x 1.5m wide, for the Banners in the Terrace display. The Shire of Esperance will cover the cost of banner construction and assist the winner with converting their design to a full scale version.
