How Employees Invite Hackers

Hackers stealing data from the NSA and nabbing millions of customer records from Equifax should be a concern for all of us. However, the majority of hacks aren't against the big dogs; they're against small to mid-sized businesses. And usually, this doesn't involve actual hacking at all. Much of the time, approximately 60% according to the *Harvard Business Review*, an unwitting employee accidentally

leaves the digital front door open.

1. They'll slip up because they don't know any better

Some Truths About Your Laptop Battery

Batteries in many devices nowadays are lithiumbased, either lithium-ion or lithium-polymer, so users must take note of the following guidelines for their proper maintenance:

- They can't be overcharged, even if you leave your battery plugged in for a long time. When the battery hits 100%, it'll stop charging.
- Leaving your battery completely drained will damage it.
- Batteries have limited lifespans. So no matter what you do, yours will age from the very first time you charge it.

What Else Can Degrade Your Battery?

Even though a modern laptop battery cannot be overcharged, keeping your battery fully charged at all times can cause it to degrade due to higher-than-normal voltages.

Additionally, both extremely high temperatures (above 70°F) and low temperatures (between 32-41°F) can reduce battery capacity and damage its components. The same goes for

storing a battery for long periods of time, which can lead to the state of extreme discharge. Another factor is physical damage - batteries are made up of sensitive materials, and physical collision can damage them.

How To Prolong Your Battery Life

Now that you know some facts about your laptop battery, it's time to learn how to delay its demise:

- Never leave your battery completely drained.
- Don't expose your battery to extremely high or low temperatures.
- If possible, charge your battery at a lower voltage.
- If you need to use your laptop for a long period of time while plugged into a power source, it's better to remove the battery. This is because a plugged-in laptop generates more heat which can then damage the battery.
- When you need to store your battery for a few weeks, you should recharge your battery to 40% and remove it from your laptop storage.

Trivial Matters

March is National Women's History Month. It dates back to March 8, 1857, when women from New York City factories staged a protest over working conditions. It was expanded to Women's History Week in 1981, and then expanded to a month in 1987. Here are some interesting facts and statistics that you may not know.

- According to the 2016 U.S. Census, women outnumber men in the U.S. 164 million to 159 million.
- By age 85, women outnumber men 2 to 1.
- For the first time since measurement began in 1940, women are more likely than men to have a bachelor's degree.
- More than 70% of moms with kids under 18 work. In 1975, fewer than 47% did.
- In the U.S., women make up nearly half of the civilian workforce at 47.4 %.

- Almost half, 44%, of women are the primary breadwinners in their households, an almost four-fold increase since 1960.
- Although female representation in government has increased steadily in recent decades, it remains at only about 23%.
- Women make up around 14% of active U.S. military members.
- The two highest IQ scores in recorded history belong to women.
- Mary Kies was the first woman to receive a patent for weaving straw with silk in 1809.
 Women over the years have patented nonreflective glass, disposable diapers, white out, among many other innovations.
- The first person to go over Niagara Falls in a wooden barrel was also a woman - Annie Edson Taylor on October 24, 1901.

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Quick Tech Productivity Pointers

Everyone is familiar with **Google Search** and most of us use it every day to find information we need. However, most people are not aware of how to make the most out of this search engine. Read on to use Google like a pro.

Include and Exclude Keywords

Google will understand most of the search terms you type into it. However, at times the search engine will match only some of the words you typed, showing limited results. To avoid this, just point out which keywords are the most important by adding a plus symbol (+) in front of words you would like Google to include in the search results.

If the results you're looking for get pushed off the page by similar yet irrelevant articles, adding a minus symbol (-) in front of keywords you don't want to see will avoid them popping up in the first place. For example, "+cloud services -hybrid cloud" will provide search results about different cloud services while excluding results related to hybrid cloud. Additionally, searching a phrase within double quotation marks guarantees to retrieve results that include only the exact phrase that matches your query.

Do a Website Search

Ever need to look for information from a specific website? Instead of visiting that website and sifting through different pages, Google makes it a breeze by allowing you to add "site:url" to the end of your search query. For example, if you want to find what Forbes has written about security, simply head to Google's homepage and

type "security site:www.forbes.com." This makes sure Google includes only pages from Forbes that are about security in your search results. You can also limit search results to university and government websites by adding "site:.edu" or "site:.gov" to your search. Combining this with the keyword trick above will narrow your search even more.

Search By Time Period

By specifying a date range you can find what

you're looking for faster. Just run a search like you normally would. Then click on Tools under the search box and hit the *Any time* drop-down menu. From there, you can choose the time period parameter, such as past month or week,

or fill in an exact time period.

Use Google to Locate Files

While Google mainly focuses on indexing web pages, it also indexes publicly available files like PDFs and spreadsheets. To look for them, just type in "filetype:" after your search query. For example, typing "report filetype:pdf" will provide PDFs with "report" in the title.

Advance Your Search

Advanced Search can be accessed by clicking Settings from the toolbar located under the search box. This gives you more ways to refine your searches, such as by region or language.
