Studying Law at Swinburne

Swinburne's law school offers an undergraduate program that focuses on commercial law with emphasis on intellectual property law, and it is the only degree in Victoria with this specialisation.

Focused on commercial law, with a distinct emphasis on intellectual property, technology, and innovation, it offers students a degree that stresses practical skills and real-world experience. Students complete law-related professional experience placements at organisations in Australia or overseas. Students are also introduced to the practical aspects of legal practice through moot court scenarios and advocacy exercises.

The Swinburne Bachelor of Laws program is fully accredited by the Council of Legal Education in Victoria and offers students the option of a single degree or combined program with arts, science, business, or engineering. The VCE prerequisites are Units 3 and 4 – a study score of at least 30 in EAL or 25 in any English other than EAL.

- Named after engineer, military leader and public administrator Sir John Monash, Monash University was established in 1958
- Monash University became a founding member of the Group of Eight universities in 1999

- Monash ranks in the top 1% of world university rankings - <u>Ranking</u>
- Monash has over 77,000 students, with campuses in <u>Malaysia</u>, <u>China</u>, <u>India</u>, <u>Italy</u>, besides its five campuses in Australia <u>-</u> <u>locations</u>
- Monash University is the only Victorian university to offer a Direct Entry medical program for students completing year 12 as well as a Graduate Entry program leading to the same degree – <u>Bachelor of</u> <u>Medical Science and Doctor of Medicine</u> (MD)
- There are ten <u>Monash Faculties</u> offering hundreds of <u>courses</u>, be they single or double undergraduate degrees, or graduate qualifications up to a PhD

WHAT DOES AN OTOLARYNGOLOGIST DO?

The Career Cornerstone website indicates that an otolaryngologist is a *head and neck surgeon* who provides complete medical and surgical care for patients with diseases and disorders that affect the ears, nose, throat, the respiratory and upper alimentary systems and related structures of the head and neck. An otolaryngologist diagnoses and provides medical and/or surgical therapy or prevention of diseases, allergies, neoplasms, deformities, disorders and/or injuries of the ears, nose, sinuses, throat, respiratory and upper alimentary systems, face, jaws, and the other head and neck systems. Head and neck oncology, facial plastic and reconstructive surgery, and the treatment of disorders of hearing and voice are fundamental areas of expertise. According to the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons, to become an otolaryngologist, one must have medical and surgical training and experience as part of the selection into the training.

PRINCIPAL'S RECOMMENDATION SCHEME AT CQU



At CQUniversity we believe senior schooling results are important, but we also believe that other factors such as motivation, talent, and passion can lead to student success at university. So, we have introduced a pilot program, the Principal's Recommendation Scheme, that allows Year 12 students to apply to a CQUniversity course based on the recommendation of their high school Principal rather than ATAR.

So, CQUniversity's Principal's Recommendation Scheme provides an alternate entry pathway to CQUniversity courses that is based on the recommendation of a students' high school Principal and not reliant on whether they have received an ATAR.

CAREER AS AN ANTHROPOLOGIST

According to the Good Universities Career Guide, <u>anthropologists</u> study the origin, development and functioning of human societies and cultures, as they exist now or have existed throughout history. Anthropologists are concerned with the complexities of social and cultural life, including religion, rituals, family and kinship systems, languages, art, music, symbolism, and economic and political systems.

Successful anthropologists -

- Have the capacity for detailed observation and accurate practical work
- Can work independently
- Have enthusiasm for research
- Good oral and written communication
 skills
- Sensitive to other people and cultures.

To become an anthropologist, students usually

have to complete a degree in *science, arts, social science* or *international studies* at university with a major in anthropology (preferably at honours level), followed by a postgraduate qualification in anthropology. The Digital Apprenticeship Program is for people looking for a career change or finishing year 12. You will get to work with digital technologies and solve problems for things that matter, and no degree is necessary.

The **Digital Apprenticeship Program** is for Australian citizens who are passionate about digital technology and are interested in digital technology and solving problems. If you enjoy pulling apart or building PCs, setting up home networks, building apps, finding trends in data or simply problem solving and making things simple, then you should consider applying.

There are many different digital and technical roles within government agencies, and these roles support the core functions of each agency and are always changing. Past apprentices have worked in the following areas:

- cyber security
- user research
- programming
- interactive media
- software engineering
- big data
- networking
- systems analysis and design
- web development
- data analytics
- systems testing
- infrastructure support
- networking
- help desk
- applications development

Apprenticeship locations vary each year and often at locations all over the country. For 2021, the majority of positions will be for Canberra, and positions outside of Canberra will depend on agency demand and workforce requirements. The benefits of the program include -
