




Changes to VCE coming in 2023

The VCE VM 2023

- VCE remains the same
- VCE Vocational Major (VM) is a new program integrated within the VCE – replacing Intermediate and Senior VCAL


Certificate options



VCE

Victorian Certificate of Education


- Two-year senior secondary certificate
- 20 to 24 units – one unit is one semester
- More than 90 subjects (called studies) to choose from, plus Vocational Education and Training subjects (VET)
- A study has Units 1 and 2 (Year 11) and Units 3 and 4 (Year 12)
- An English study is compulsory
- School assessments and final exams lead to study scores
- Study scores lead to an ATAR



VCE - VM

VCE Vocational Major – a program within the VCE

- Two-year senior secondary certificate
- 16 to 20 units
- Four compulsory subjects VCE VM: Literacy, Numeracy, Personal Development Skills, Work Related Skills
- Compulsory VET subject
- Gain credit from time in workplace
- Assessment based on learning activities
- No study scores and no ATAR



VET

Vocational Education and Training (VET)

- Nationally recognised training
- Develop industry specific knowledge and practical skills
- More than 40 certificate qualifications across 27 VCE VET programs
- Different schools offer different VET courses
- Often undertaken at local TAFE or in-school options



Which VCE Certificate is right for me?

Each pathway builds on the learning strengths and aspirations of the student



VCE student

Classroom focus where you:

- build deep knowledge of a subject area
- apply theoretical skills and knowledge through experiments, practical activities.

Add a vocational focus through a VET subject.



VCE Vocational Major student

Applied learning focus where you:

- concentrate on your future through real world learning contexts
- learn in a classroom, the workplace, and community

You'll develop project management skills and an understanding of others.

Why did you choose the VCE?


I chose the VCE because it allowed me to take the prerequisites for my dream course, criminology. The VCE seemed to be the most suitable option in terms of getting to my desired career pathway.

How did you choose your VCE studies?

I chose my VCE studies on a preference basis, rather than prerequisite basis. If you do what you enjoy, you are going to do well in it. Especially with the pressure surrounding Year 12, you want to incur minimal stress and maximum potential for mastery.

What is your advice to future VCE students?

The VCE is an amazing platform for you to really explore your potential. A lot of the time, students think the VCE is about assessing one's achievements merely through grades. Quite frankly, it is the opposite. Students are given a multitude of subjects to choose from. Don't put pressure on yourself and use the time to discover your interests, take subjects you enjoy and not ones that are 'scaled up.' At the end of the day, scaling is subject to statistical fluctuations, whereas passion has no measure to it and gets you where you need to be. In summation: believe and you will achieve.

Why did you choose the VCE?

I wanted to attend university in the future and I was up for the challenge. It felt really good finishing Year 12 and I was proud of myself. Although it was one of the most stressful and hardest times in my life, it was also one of the best. I got closer with my friends and learnt many things about myself, including how I study, my limits and how I can succeed.

How did you choose your VCE studies?

I did the subjects that I was passionate about and thought that I would enjoy. I didn't pick them based on the scaling or how hard they were perceived to be. I had to study Units 3 and 4 Biology in Year 12 without doing Units 1 and 2 because I hadn't done a VCE science subject. However, I ended up loving it and it was one of my highest study scores.

What is your advice to future VCE students?

Keep up with everything and try your best. Treat yourself to some chocolate occasionally. Your ATAR is going to be a lot better than you initially expect. Year 12 really isn't that bad when you think about it, so have some fun with it!



Prerequisite Studies



Prerequisites are VCE studies you must have completed to be eligible for selection into a course. They are set two years in advance so that Year 10 students can plan ahead.

What are prerequisites?

Prerequisites set the knowledge and skills you need to understand a course's content. If you haven't completed the prerequisite subjects (or equivalent) for a course, you won't be selected. This is why it is important to look ahead to what you might want to study after school, before selecting your Years 11 & 12 subjects.





3+4 Units = Sequence




VCE Minimum Requirements

- Satisfactory completion of **(minimum) 16 VCE or VET Units**
- Including at least 3 English units
- Including a Unit 3/4 sequence in an English
- Three other Unit 3/4 sequences




English Options – Year 11

English is the only compulsory subject in your VCE.

- English as an Additional Language



VCE Year 12 Program Planning

The blocking remains similar in Year 12, however, generally a student undertakes five subjects plus RE in Year 12. This means that one of the subjects from Year 11 is not continued.

Advantages

- **Broad** range of subjects
- Benefits of VET

Disadvantages

- Only studying one unit of a sequence (English, English Language) will **not** maximise prior knowledge for Yr. 12

- * Catholic Action Program cannot be undertaken in both Year 11 and 12 (Will require an application form)






VCE – Vocational Major (VCE-VM)

Program Planning

VCE-VM Minimum Requirements

- Satisfactorily complete a total (**minimum**) of at least 16 Units of study over the two years of the VCE VM
- At least two of these units must be VET units at Certificate II level or above
- Satisfactorily completed units must include:
 - Three Literacy or VCE English units (including a Unit 3 and 4 sequence)
 - Two Numeracy or VCE Mathematics units
 - Two Work Related Skills units
 - Two Personal Developmental Skills units
 - Two VET Credits at Certificate II level or above (180 hours)
 - A minimum of four Unit 3-4 sequences which can include the units listed above as well as any VCE units



GENERAL ACHIEVEMENT TEST (GAT)

General Achievement Test (GAT)

- All students enrolled in one or more VCE or scored VCE VET Unit 3-4 sequence will be required to sit Sections A and B. VCE VM students will sit Section A
- The GAT will be split into two sections:
- Section A will assess literacy and numeracy skills
- Section B will assess skills in mathematics, science, technology, the arts and humanities, with an increased focus on critical and creative thinking skills
- Why is the GAT important:
 - It allows for a derived score to be calculated in exceptional circumstances for scored VCE students
 - Senior VCAL students will receive a statement indicating whether they have met the literacy and numeracy standards. It will provide an additional opportunity for Senior VCAL students to demonstrate their skills and level of achievement.
 - It helps the school to analyse student assessments on a whole school level
- Try your best but do not study beyond what is covered at school



Why choose a VET subject?

How do you like to learn?


- Study a subject you enjoy
- Add to your ATAR or VCE qualification (most VET courses carry full VCE unit status)
- Lead to an additional qualification at the end of your VCE/VCE-VM journey
- Provide a direct pathway to a TAFE course
- Provide credits towards TAFE and University courses
- Develop industry specific skills

How VET is Structured

- Usual entry is at Year 11
- Some students commence their VET program in Year 10 as an Accelerated Study and this subject counts for 2 elective units
- Students work through modules with outcomes being assessed for competency
- Assessment is based on students being able to perform tasks and demonstrate skills linked to a specific industry



Application Process



- Complete Mater Christi subject selection process and the VET enrolment form located on the College website
- If the application is accepted, students are enrolled in the VET subject of choice and will receive email confirmation of this.
- Parents will receive further information following completion of the application process




Higher Education Studies Program

Higher Study During Year 12

The College supports high-achieving, able and interested Year 11 students to undertake two first-year university subjects at a range of Victorian Universities (e.g. Deakin, Monash, Uni Melb etc) through the **VCAA's Higher Education Studies Program**.

Potential Benefits of a Higher Study:

- Access to a broader range of academically challenging subjects at Deakin University
- Receive credit towards an undergraduate qualification at University
- Contributes to ATAR by receiving an increment for the higher study as a fifth or sixth study
- Contributes towards satisfactory completion for the award of the VCE as a Unit 3–4 sequence without a study score
- Opportunity to experience university studies and a different style of learning
- Gain credit for the higher study and go straight into second year at a University in that discipline.



Higher Studies Application Process




High-achieving, able and interested students are to complete an expression of interest form and submit to the VCE Learning Leader for consideration.

Application and other learning data is reviewed to determine if the student meets the preferred University's selection criteria (see below)

The criteria for selection includes:

- Completing Year 12 in 2023
- A high achiever with above average results in Year 11 (minimum 65% average across all subjects)
- Meet the pre-requisite or co-requisite VCE subject requirement, if required for preferred subjects
- Like being challenged
- Excellent organisational skills and able to work independently
- Planning to go to university and have a desire to accelerate future university studies
- Consistently high rate of attendance and above-average work habits throughout Years 7-11






What is VTAC?

Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre



- Scales study scores
- Calculates ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank)



ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank)



What the ATAR is:


The ATAR is a rank, not a score. It's designed specifically to assist some tertiary institutions in selecting applicants for some courses.

The ATAR allows tertiary institutions to competitively rank students who have completed different combinations of VCE studies

The ATAR is reported as a number between 0.00 and 99.95 with increments of 0.05. A student with an ATAR of 75.00 has achieved VCE results above 75 per cent of the Year 12 cohort across the state.

The ATAR isn't a reflection of you as a person, and there's no pass or fail ATAR. Everyone who receives an ATAR has passed the VCE.



How to qualify for an ATAR

To qualify for an ATAR through VTAC, a student must: qualify for the VCE, and achieve study scores in at least four permissible Unit 3 and 4 VCE studies, including one from the English group.

What if I do VCE-VM?

VCE-VM students do not receive an ATAR and can therefore only immediately apply for courses that don't use the ATAR to select students for entry (see 'Pathways' for other opportunities).

How is the ATAR calculated?

- The calculation of your ATAR begins with your VCE study scores, provided by VCAA
- VTAC then scales these scores to ensure fairness. This produces scaled study scores
- An aggregate is created by adding up your primary four: your highest scaled study score in one of English, English (EAL), Literature or English Language and the three next highest VTAC scaled study scores permissible
- Your increments: Often ten per cent of any fifth and sixth permissible scaled study scores that are available



Scaling – keeping things fair

What is it?

Scaling adjusts for the fact that it is more difficult to obtain a high VCE study score in some studies than others. This is **not** because some studies are inherently harder or easier. It is because some studies attract a more competitive cohort of students.

Scaling ensures that students are neither advantaged nor disadvantaged based on the studies they choose. All VCE study scores are scaled by VTAC.
