Vacation Alert: Criminals Can Connect the Dots

Summer is fast approaching... the season when you and your team will be taking a little time off to head to your favorite vacation spot. Although you should completely disconnect from work, most of us will still check email and do a little work while away— and that could end up causing some issues if you are not careful while working remotely.

So before you head off to have a little fun in the sun with your laptop in tow, here's a word to the wise: **never automatically connect to ANY available network**. Not all Internet connections are secure, so if you're going to log into the company's network, email or other critical cloud apps that are hosting sensitive information, ONLY do so on a trusted, secured WiFi and NEVER a public one. We recommend investing in a personal MiFi device that acts as a mobile WiFi hotspot if you're going to be traveling a lot and accessing company information. Additionally, it's a good idea to turn off the ability to automatically connect for ALL of your mobile devices and laptops. You will still be able to connect manually, but it will prevent your laptop or device from connecting to a questionable network without your consent or knowledge. While you're at it, disable all printer and file-sharing options on your mobile devices. This is another way hackers can gain access to your network.

Vacations are a great way to get some much needed R&R; however, deviating from our daily routine makes it much easier for us to misplace and possibly lose our mobile devices. Apple's *Find My iPhone* app is a lifesaver if an iPhone or iPad goes missing. By logging into iCloud, you have the option of playing a sound if you believe the device is nearby. Otherwise, you can lock the phone and display a contact phone number along with a personal message. As a last resort, if you fear that your phone is lost forever, you can even erase your device. Similarly, Android Device Manager is Google's official tracking app for Android phones and tablets. Simply log into your Google account, type the phrase "find my phone" into Google's search engine on your PC, and select your device to locate it. You can also set it to lock and erase your device remotely if you choose. Another option for locating a lost phone is using Google Maps. This method only works if you have Location Reporting and Location History enabled on your phone. Go to Google Maps Location History and click to see your timestamps. These show everywhere your phone has been in reverse chronological order. There are also services that help track Mac and Windows PCs that have gone missing. Call us to learn what your options are! Speaking of Dots...

The .dot file extension (**DO**cument **I**emplate) is used by Microsoft Word to store document templates. A template is a document type that creates a copy of itself when you open it. Templates contain pre-formatted settings and allow users to recreate documents with pre-defined margins, headers, fonts and page styles to maintain consistency AND save time. Within a template, you can provide recommended sections or required text for others to use, as well as content controls such as a predefined dropdown list or a company logo.

A number of predefined Word templates for most kinds of documents are available on templates.office.com. You can also create your own template by creating a document, selecting "Save As" and changing the "Save as type" to "Word Template."

Templates created in older versions of Word (Word 97-2003) have the .dot file extension. While templates created in Word 2007 and later versions have the .dotx (XML file format) extension or .dotm if they are macro-enabled to automate repetitive tasks.
