
Welcome to the second edition of the AITIS bulletin for the school year 2024/2025. This edition covers a period from November 2024 through January 2025.

Professor Pai-Chi Li, AIT president visited AITIS on December 10, 2024. He took time to move around the school before having a short chat with the school principal for the well-


being of the school. We also talked about the challenges that the school is having. Finally, the president had a few words with the students and the staff during the assembly period.



Loy Krathong is a festival that Thai people on the full moon night of the twelfth-month on the Thai calendar, celebrate for thanking the water god for the water that they've been using for the entire year.





Third, when every house has finished making the krathongs, we test them by floating them for 5 minutes. Afterward, we see the results from each house. This is really fun and interesting, as every house cheers for their krathong not to sink because no one wants to lose points.





While every Thai person and some foreigners celebrate Loy Krathong, AITIS also shows special respect for this day. We celebrate it in a fun and competitive manner.

First, we gather at our houses for a meeting to select 2 groups from Grades 3 to 6 to take part in the competition.

Second, we bring materials for making the krathong, such as banana leaves, banana stems, flowers for decoration, candles, incense sticks, and pins.

Finally, we have to take class photos with our beautiful and brightly colored krathongs before taking them home at the end of the day to float with our families.












Loy Krathong is a great celebration as we really get the opportunity to say thank you to the water goddess and pray, she takes away our sins and bad luck as we float our krathongs.


# AITIS Successfully Conducts School Bus Emergency Drill

As we begin 2025, I'd like to share some important updates and resources to support your child's mental health and well-being during the second semester.

### Lunch Bunch Sessions:

A new session of Lunch Bunch begins in January 2025! Lunch Bunch is a Social Emotional Learning group that focuses on a variety of skills, including emotional regulation, friendship and social skills, and executive functioning. Groups are made up of 4-6 same-grade peers and meet weekly for 30 minutes after lunch on school days. By offering Lunch Bunch, I am reaching out to all students at AITIS. This allows me to build rapport with them before any issues arise. Students learn where my office is and how I can help them. It also provides an opportunity for students to get to know me and the services I offer in an informal setting. Meeting with students over lunch is a neutral time, which helps dispel myths that they are in "trouble" if they are coming to the school counselor's office.

### Counseling Services:

If your child ever needs mental health support, counseling is a free and confidential service available to all AITIS students. To use this service, a child can fill out a form outside my office or contact me directly, and I can submit a referral on your child's behalf.


# AMAZING ALUMNI Anisha Karna

The beige-colored walls, the yellow-painted doors that greeted me every morning, the endless rows of bicycle stands where I parked my bike with a sense of routine and calm—these sights became familiar anchors in the journey of my youth. The sound of birds chirping as I walked to class, the soothing rhythm of water sprinklers on the lawns every weekend, and the smell of fresh rain against the dirt—these simple, almost forgotten details have stayed with me, etched into my memory like a comforting backdrop to my formative years.

As I look back at my time in AITIS, there are moments that stand out like milestones—receiving certificates in various subjects like Maths and Science and graduating alongside my dearest classmates. However, the moments that have stuck with me all these years do not have to do with educational achievements, but those filled with warmth and kindness from my teachers and my peers. These singular moments helped me open my mind to new possibilities and to uncover my capabilities. That leap of faith wasn't easy. Leaving behind a life filled with comfort, familiarity, and a close-knit community wasn't a decision I made lightly. But it was a necessary one, driven by my passion for medicine and the deep-rooted desire to help others. Leaving the AIT campus and transitioning to life in Nepal was both exciting and daunting. I immersed myself in the challenging curriculum of medical school, driven by the values instilled in me at AITIS and by my family—hard work, perseverance, and compassion. The academic challenges were immense, but I never felt alone. AITIS had already given me the resilience to overcome obstacles and the confidence to face the unknown.

I completed my studies in Medicine and Surgery, and I am now a proud doctor, practicing in the very field I had dreamed of as a child. The path was not without its hurdles—long hours, emotional tolls, and moments of doubt—but the foundation laid by my early years at AITIS kept me grounded. It was there that I learned not only how to be a good student but how to be a thoughtful, compassionate individual—qualities that are essential in medicine. Even after all these years, I maintain connections with some of my old classmates and teachers. We often reminisce about the days spent at AIT—laughing about shared experiences, discussing the paths we've taken, and marveling at how far we've all come. Those relationships continue to be a source of strength and inspiration, reminding me that the journey of learning never truly ends.






