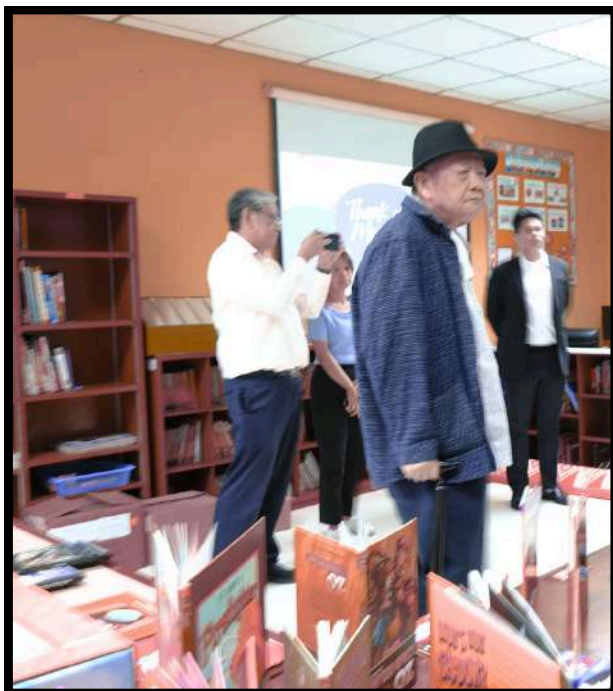

Mr. Lee's generous support for AITIS began in 2020 with the introduction of the Build Something Different (BSD) software, which our students use in their ICT classes.*

*Ahead of his visit, AITIS received a donation of books valued at THB 867,569 to enrich our school library and support the learning of both students and staff.*

*The school remains deeply grateful to Mr. Lee and his team for their continued generosity and partnership.*



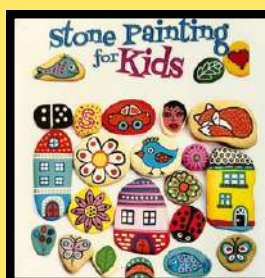
*AITIS also continues to value collaboration with AIT units through activities that challenge our students to showcase their creativity, knowledge, and skills. The Office of Sustainable Campus (OSC), AIT, invited our students to participate in the "Waste to Worth" Kids' Competition at the AIT Decarbonization Nexus 2025.*





*This project-based competition inspired students to think creatively about recycling and upcycling. A total of 89 students participated, with the best 13 projects selected and 7 students receiving cash prizes. Beyond the awards, the competition deepened students' understanding of sustainability and the practical reuse of waste materials.*

*Our after-school program for the semester is now in full swing, and students continue to learn and have fun in the safe and supportive environment of AITIS. Stay tuned for more exciting updates as the semester progresses!*

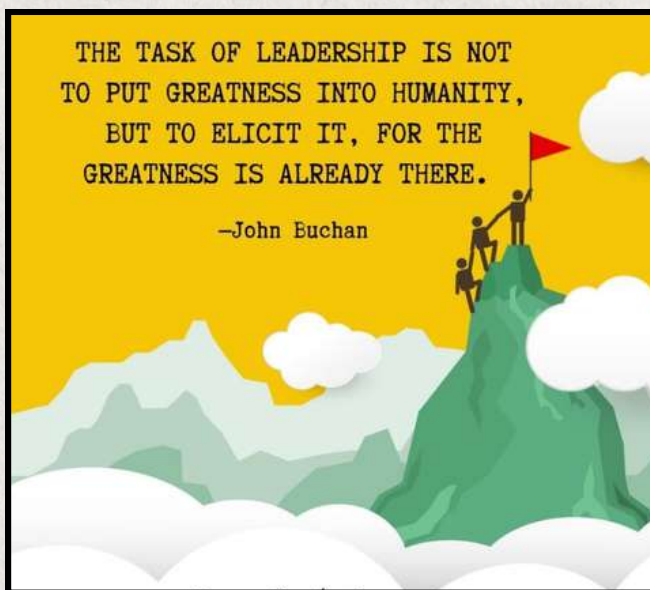

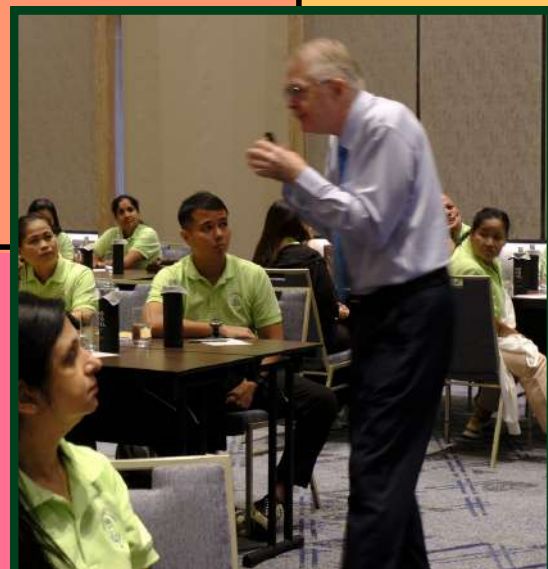

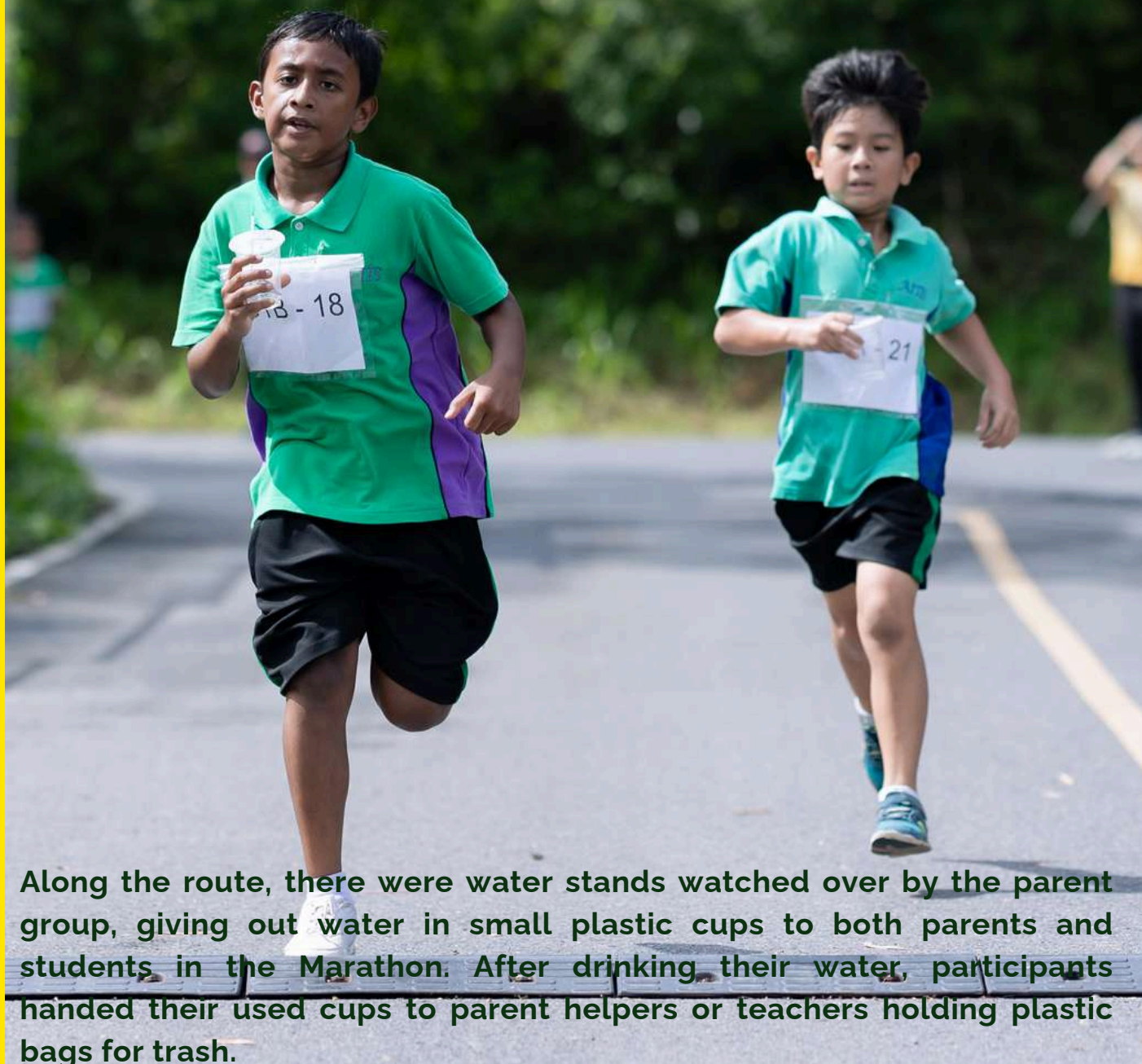




# MONSOON MARATHON

Directions along the route were given by PTA, teachers, or guards. Grade 1, 2, and 3 students followed a shorter route, while Grade 4, 5, 6, and parents took a longer one around the football field.

The Pre-K section had a fun 'Dino-Run.' Some PTA members and teachers dressed up to look like they were riding dinosaurs and ran alongside the kids. The Pre-K children followed a much shorter route and finished in the Pavilion area.



At the finish line, teachers wrote down the names of the students who finished first. There was also an iPad recording to help make sure the results were correct. Every student and parent wore a bib number, so the awards could go to the right person.



During the awards ceremony, both students and parents received medals, but only the top 10 from each grade were chosen. For students, ten boys and ten girls from each grade got awards. For parents, the top ten men and top ten women were also recognized.

## GRADE 6 TEAM BUILDING

*On Wednesday, 24 September 2025, the annual Grade 6 Ace Achievers team building session was hosted. The event aimed to break down social barriers, foster empathy, and promote inclusive and trusting relationships among students. The teachers involved were Mrs. Hasmina, Mrs. Jejay, Mr. Earl, Mr. James, Mr. Jay, and Mrs. Anushree, the Grade 6 Teacher.*



*The session began with an exercise by Mrs. Hasmina to help the students get comfortable with each other. The two activities Mrs. Hasmina had planned were "Avengers Shield Fling" and "If I were a superhero." The first activity aimed to have the students work as a team to assemble the Avengers and use their superpowers to throw paper plates into baskets.*



*The activity helped develop the ability to talk with each other to help throw the plates. The second activity was based around the students cosplaying as superheroes, and the students had to write their superpowers and what they would do with them.*



*The students continued the session outside after their snack break with a game from Mrs. Jejay called "Paper Basket." The game aimed to put as many paper balls in the basket as possible using communication and smart strategies under levels of difficulty.*



*After Mrs. Jejay's game, we went inside, then Mr. Earl introduced his game, The "Tangram Team Collaboration Challenge." The groups worked together to solve tangram shape puzzles under the challenge of the time constraints while holding each other's hands, restricting self-work, and encouraging communication between the group.*





*At the last period before lunch, we went outside again, Mr. James and his game began. The groups had to coordinate with a song using specific footwork to get a ball placed in a basket. There was a person at the back acting as a coordinator for the whole group. The rest were blindfolded, and they could not speak. This activity encouraged synchronization between members and communication without speech in tough times.*



*Mr. Jay's challenge came shortly after lunch when we went back inside. The two games were the "Stack and Run" and the "Magic Spoon." The Magic Spoon game aimed to get the food from the center of the circle and bring it to each other's bowls, representing stomachs. The spoons were too big to bring to your own bowl. The game encouraged teamwork, trust, communication, and empathy.*

*The last 2 periods before going home were hosted by Mrs. Anushree. It was reflection and transformation. The first activity that Mrs. Anushree had hosted was the "Empathy Circle." The students had to sit in a circle and Mrs. Anushree gave papers to everyone with questions that students had to answer to by standing up and holding a talking object (only the one holding it could speak about the answer of their question.)*







The last activity was “A letter to my class.” Students had to write an anonymous letter using 3 starting lines, “Dear Class, I want to say...” “I hope we can...” and lastly “Let’s work on...” These activities encouraged self-expression, empathy, and honest communication among classmates, helping everyone understand each other better and strengthen the class bond. The last activity was a wrap-up, the class promise poster. A large poster was created by the students putting pledges to respect in class. Instead of directly signing the poster, the students cleverly thought of putting their handprints on the poster.

In my personal experience, the Grade 6 Team Building session was a fun and important experience that showed how simple games were used to teach important skills such as teamwork, trust, and communication. This experience taught me to use these games in real-life scenarios where I will need to use these skills.
